<u>Sermon</u>

Let's begin with a prayer. "Loving God, on this Pentecost Sunday we invite your Holy Spirit to come and speak to our hearts now, to teach us, to challenge us and to encourage us afresh through exploring your Word. Amen" In autumn 1904, in the valleys of South Wales, a preacher, Evan Roberts, began a series of nightly prayer meetings at Moriah chapel in Loughor. He made urgent appeals to the people to rise and confess Christ publicly. Each night the presence of the Holy Spirit became more powerful and more people confessed Jesus Christ as their Saviour. One night he urged everyone to pray "O send the Holy Spirit now for Jesus Christ's sake", whereupon the Spirit descended with great fire upon the people present and they prayed until late.

The revival meetings were extraordinary with people crying for joy or crying for sorrow over their sin. Some people would be praying out loud, others singing and the chapels were filled to capacity with crowds outside. They lasted until 2 or 3 in the morning so that men coming off the night shift in



the colliery met the people coming out of the meetings. The Revival spread like wildfire from place to place all over the country where people had been praying that such a thing would happen.

Thousands of people were saved. Pubs became almost empty, money wasted on alcohol was now being saving it and used to buy clothes and food for their families. Stealing and other offences became less and less. Often a magistrate came to court and found that there were no cases for him to try.

Men who blasphemed learned to talk purely. The miners' pit ponies were so used to being sworn at that they became disobedient! People who had quarrelled forgave each other and were reconciled. Society was changed and Wales became a God-fearing nation.

I love this story because revivals excite me. In an era when much of church in UK has been in decline, at least regarding attendance, it is good to be reminded that it has not always been this way, and that God's Spirit can, and does, come on churches, regions and nations impacting lives of many.

There have been many other revivals of the church in UK throughout history such as:

- Protestant reformation of 16th Century when church had become all about power and influence
- Wesley and Whitfield and the birth of methodism in UK in 18th C, when churchgoing and the moral standard was lower even than now (had though that may be to be believe)
- Revival on the Isle of Lewis in the Hebrides in mid 20th C, when church was dry and legalistic


And there are still plenty of revivals and moves of the Holy Spirit throughout the world in the present era, where there is amazing church growth in countries like China, Brazil, Iran and Nigeria.

When revival comes it affects large numbers with these characteristics:

- Repentance and right living an acknowledgement of personal sin and self-centred living, asking Jesus to forgive them and living holy and Christ-centred lives. Whole communities are changed as people live righteously
- Exalting Jesus there is great focus on Jesus, on exalting his name, on praising him, on living for him. It is not about us, but about him.
- Prayer there is always a renewed emphasis on prayer as people have a passion to get to know Jesus better and intercede on behalf of others.
- Mission excited by the work of the Holy Spirit in their own lives Christians are fired up to tell others about Jesus, to serve the poor, to heal the sick

• Revival is always a work of the Holy Spirit, rather than something that Christians can bring about of their own accord.

We see these characteristics in the first great move of the Holy Spirit recorded on the day of Pentecost that we read in Acts 2. A day that was part of God's great plan. A day that the events that we have been looking at over the last few weeks when Jesus journeyed to Jerusalem were leading to. Jesus had fulfilled his purpose on earth. He had taught people about the kingdom



of God, reframing their view of who God is and how they should live, especially their attitudes to the marginalised in society. He had showed people the power of God and love he has in healing the sick and performing miracles. He had died on the cross for the sins of the world. He had risen from the dead to show the power of God and defeat the evil one. And he had prepared the disciples for his ascension and return to heaven, sending them out to proclaim the good news and heal the sick, instating Peter as their leader and telling them to wait for the Holy Spirit.

Because the earthly person of Jesus could do no more. He was one physical being limited in geography and time, but God's plans were so much bigger than just the people of Israel. They always had been, but the Jewish people had become very insular and on the whole had not been the light to the gentiles they were called to be. Jesus' ministry had prepared the powder keg and the HS was the spark for the explosion that began on Pentecost when the church was born and the gospel began to spread to many nations.

God's timing is always immaculate. Jesus' crucifixion at Passover, that greatest of Jewish feasts, symbolically indicated how he was the sacrificial lamb whose blood would save people from death. And now he chooses the Jewish feast of Pentecost, when Jews from all over the Middle East had travelled to Jerusalem to celebrate, to launch the Holy Spirit in power, knowing that many would return to their homelands changed people who would spread the good news of Jesus.

We see in Acts 2 various groups of people how they were before, during and after the dynamic coming of the Holy Spirit. As we look at them, I wonder which of them and at what stage of this process you most identify with now. Firstly, we have the disciples. They were together in a house in Jerusalem, waiting, as Jesus had commanded them 10 days earlier. They were unsure of what the future would hold exactly, but remained together and obedient. And then when the Holy Spirit dramatically came upon them all with a violent wind filling the room and tongues of fire resting on their heads they began to speak in foreign languages that they didn't know. Their patience and obedience was followed up with a willingness to allow the Holy Spirit to completely fill them and enable them to declare the wonders of God in these other tongues. But they clearly weren't speaking quietly or tucked away in the corner of this house because, worried what others might think of them as they spoke what to them would have sounded like gobbledygook. Whether they went outside the house or stood by the windows there was no fear, only boldness, as a crowd

started forming as they heard their own native languages being spoken by these uneducated Gailileans with a funny accent. This boldness was especially shown by Peter when he stood up to address the Jewish crowd, explained that Jesus was their Messiah and that they needed to repent.

And then we have the various members of the crowd, who react differently as events unfold. Many, when they hear the disciples speaking in their language, and clearly many others, are naturally puzzled, bewildered as to why and how this is happening. They are amazed, curious, open hearted and want to know more about the God that is being praised.

But then there are the cynics who made fun of them by saying they had had too much wine, people with closed hearts, who either like to have a laugh to impress their friends, or use humour to deflect from the fear of having to change.

Some of those who then listened to Peter's testimony would decided not to believe whether out of fear, or cynicism, or needing more time to reflect on his words. But others were cut to the heart, as v37 says, and knew they needed to respond with repentance and acceptance of Jesus. I imagine they would have told their friends of their miraculous encounter with the living God because 3000 people became believers that day, almost certainly not all were gathered around that house initially.

There are many today who feel that God is doing something new today during this worldwide pandemic, whether you want to call it revival or not, that the Holy Spirit is at work afresh. The New Statesman magazine last month contained and article which picked up on this, so it is not going unnoticed in the secular world. Dr Rowan Williams, the former archbishop of Canterbury, was reported in this article as saying this pandemic has triggered a "historic spiritual moment". You have probably read about the results of surveys that show that nearly 25% of people in the UK have watched an online service or listened to one on the radio in the last 2 months, far more than would usually go to church in that period, and we have good numbers watching this service. Surveys that indicate that 5% of British people have started praying, seeking God, during this pandemic, people who have never done so before. Online sales of physical bibles have skyrocketed, as have downloads of bible apps, searches for prayer, resources for prayer etc. Many churches who are running online Alpha or similar explorer courses have reported greater numbers participating then ever. Christians are praying more and seeking God more. Churches are responding in sacrificial service to their communities running foodbanks, meal delivery schemes, shop and drop services all over the country.

Something is stirring and many Christian leaders believe it is a move of the Holy Spirit. So my question for us today is who are we most like in the story of Pentecost when it comes to the coming of the Holy Spirit.

• Are we like the disciples, prayerfully and obediently waiting for this moment and when the Holy Spirit comes joining in with his work, allowing him to take control of our lives, being bold in sharing our faith and serving God in new ways? I heard a lovely phrase this week from Pastor Agu Irukwu, a senior pastor of a Nigerian church in London, about "setting our sails to be guided by the wind of the

spirit" which captures this attitude beautifully. If so then keep praying, seeking God and how about being bold and inviting friends or family members on our new Life Explored or Alpha courses, details of which are in Notes and News.

- Or maybe we are like those in the crowd who are hearing about the work of the Holy Spirit, puzzled, amazed and want to know more. In which case I would urge you to pray 'Come Holy Spirit', inviting him to fill you afresh or for the first time.
- Or maybe your first reaction to the work of the Holy Spirit is a cynical one "there's a logical explanation", "I've not experienced it so it can't be real", "I have bad experiences of people who talk about the Holy Spirit". In which case I would urge you to check yourself, reflect on why you think this way, pray for a softening of your heart. You may well need to talk to someone, so please find a good friend or a member of the ministry team, we would love to help you.

Next week we begin a series which continues from Pentecost, called "The ordinary and the extraordinary", following various characters from the book of Acts, ordinary people like you and me, as they responded to the Holy Spirit's prompting with all the challenges that entails that will help us respond to the Holy Spirit in our lives.

Whether a spiritual revival that this nation desperately needs is coming soon or not is God's decision, though it only ever happens through fervent prayer. But we can all respond to the Holy Spirit's prompting in our lives so I'm going to invite you now to have a time of quiet reflection and prayer. Pray "Come Holy Spirit", over and over, pray the words of the next hymn "Holy Spirit we welcome you", don't rush and let the Holy Spirit do his work.
