Genesis 6:9-22 Read by Claire Lee, All Souls'

⁹This is the account of Noah and his family.

Noah was a righteous man, blameless among the people of his time, and he walked faithfully with God. ¹⁰Noah had three sons: Shem, Ham and Japheth.

¹¹Now the earth was corrupt in God's sight and was full of violence. ¹²God saw how corrupt the earth had become, for all the people on earth had corrupted their ways. ¹³So God said to Noah, 'I am going to put an end to all people, for the earth is filled with violence because of them. I am surely going to destroy both them and the earth. ¹⁴So make yourself an ark of cypress wood; make rooms in it and coat it with pitch inside and out. ¹⁵This is how you are to build it: the ark is to be three hundred cubits long, fifty cubits wide and thirty cubits high. ¹⁶Make a roof for it, leaving below the roof an opening one cubit high all around. Put a door in the side of the ark and make lower, middle and upper decks. ¹⁷I am going to bring floodwaters on the earth to destroy all life under the heavens, every creature that has the breath of life in it. Everything on earth will perish. ¹⁸But I will establish my covenant with you, and you will enter the ark – you and your sons and your wife and your sons' wives with you. ¹⁹You are to bring into the ark two of all living creatures, male and female, to keep them alive with you. ²⁰Two of every kind of bird, of every kind of animal and of every kind of creature that moves along the ground will come to you to be kept alive. ²¹You are to take every kind of food that is to be eaten and store it away as food for you and for them.'

Acts 9:1-19a (Summarised version) – read by Rob Moore, St Peter's

Saul did not believe in Jesus, and it was his job to find Jesus' followers and put them in jail. One day he set off for a town called Damascus, looking for Christians to arrest.

Suddenly, a bright light shone down from Heaven. Saul fell to the ground and heard a voice coming from nowhere.


"Saul. Why are you persecuting me?"

"Who are you?" asked Saul.

"I am Jesus, the one you are persecuting. Go to Damascus and you will be told what to do next"

Saul got to his feet but found that he could not see. His travelling companions were also confused and led him to Damascus. Whilst in Damascus, Saul spent his time praying.

Meanwhile, Jesus spoke in a vision to a man who lived in Damascus called Ananias and told him to go to the house where Saul was staying and place his hands on Saul's eyes so he could see again.



Ananias was shocked, because he heard Saul was in Damascus to put Christians in jail, but God told him he had chosen Saul to tell people about Jesus. So Ananias went to find Saul and placed his hands upon him. He said:
“Brother Saul, Jesus himself has sent me here so that you will see again and be filled with the Holy Spirit”

Suddenly Saul could see again. He was baptised and given something to eat. After this, Saul changed his name to Paul, and went to the synagogue to preach that Jesus is the son of God.

Sermon by Rev Sam Waako 'Not everyone can be Paul (But everyone can be Ananias)'

This week we continue with our sermon series, looking at some of the 'ordinary and extra ordinary' characters in the Early Church through the book of Acts. And this week, we look at Ananias, who is not to be confused with the Ananias we looked at a couple of weeks ago, who with his wife Sapphira lied to the Holy spirit, or Ananias the high priest who Paul appeared before at the Sanhedrin in Jerusalem.

The Ananias am referring to is the 'Ananias of Damascus' who makes a very brief appearance in scripture in our Acts text today, and after fulfilling God's errand, he disappears from the pages of scripture as quickly as he had appeared. Which means, apart from his small act of trust and obedience in the Acts text, that leads to a significant change in launching the career of the most influential of the Apostles, we don't know much about this Ananias; we don't know if he was young or old, what he did for a living, whether he had any special education or training, whether he had any special gifts.. we don't know. What we know is that he was an ordinary follower of Jesus like any of us, who was ready when the Lord called his name.

Acts 9.1-19 is a popular passage, especially because of the drama surrounding Saul's conversion experience. But the part that is often passed over is that that Ananias plays in this drama, which this week reminded me of another person in recent history who played a significant role but only got the recognition he deserved after his death in 2006.



I'm talking about Peter Norman, a name I suspect many might not be familiar with. Peter Norman was the third person in what is considered to be one of the most iconic images of the 20th century, taken at the 1968 Olympics in Mexico. Time Magazine considers this image to be "perhaps the most iconic sports photograph ever taken." But this image would never have had the same impact it had on raising awareness of racism in sport and the discrimination African Americans were facing at that time in America, if Peter Norman had chosen not to stand on that podium that day with Tommie Smith and John Carlos who were the architects of this silent but powerful protest.

Peter Norman had a choice not to be a part of the silent protest when Smith and Carlos informed him of what they planned to do ~ but he chose to,

and in his own words he says to the two men, "I will stand with you." But the consequences of this act were not kind to Peter unlike the other two Americans who went on to be Heroes especially in their native America. Peter Norman was shunned by even his own country Australia; he was never chosen again to compete in the Olympics even after qualifying for the 1972 Olympics in Munich. Sadly, his small but significant role on that day slowly but surely begun to be recognised after His death in 2006. His status as a hero in the American civil rights movement was further enhanced by a record-breaking documentary done on his life in 2008 called 'Salute.'

You could say Ananias was faced with similar consequences. Just like Peter Norman might have had an idea of what his actions would lead to (am sure not to the extent it turned out) Ananias was well aware of Saul's reputation...as the number one persecutor of Christians. In fact, at this point, he had been on his way to Damascus to arrest any Christians he could find and take them to Jerusalem, where many would end up in prison or lose their lives. I have a feeling when God commanded him to go to Saul, he might have asked himself questions like; What awaits me if I go to Saul and his people? What will my fellow Christians especially in Damascus think of me having any associations with this man?

And so, like many of us am sure would have done, Ananias initially points out the 'problem' to God, effectively telling God how big this problem is. Ananias humanly shows weakness by highlighting how big the problem is and momentarily forgets how Big God is, compared to the problem.

Understandably Ananias was a little nervous about the call. And so he was apprehensive at best and fearful at worst. But the thing is, God knew exactly who Saul was and gave Ananias the assurance that He was still in control. And fortunately for Ananias, when it came to it, he chose to believe and trust in the presence and power of God, and so he went. And we know the rest of the story concerning Saul, now Paul.

Ananias' role in the drama of acts is small, yet very significant. In him we see a man who wavered when he heard God's voice, yet despite his initial hesitation, he was faithful and obedient. And God went on to use Ananias to further His purposes in launching Paul's career. Ananias small act of obedience led to a great harvest for the kingdom.

And the biggest lesson we can learn from the story of Ananias is that, small acts of obedience that are premised on the word of God, even when they seem contrary to reason, and even when they seem to challenge what seems so plain, can have great significance. Our perspective is so small but God's perspective is so big and wide.. he sees what we can't see. We just need to rely on Him, on His word, on His voice, trusting that he will lead us all the way.

We are not all called to be Paul or like Noah in our Genesis reading. We are not all going to be the one at the front, the one leading the crowd, the one who is recognized for their impact. But all of us are called to be Ananias. Just

ordinary people, like Ananias, like Peter Norman, doing small acts of trust and obedience and leaving the rest to God.

This means approaching every single interaction, no matter how common or ordinary it might seem to be with the same words that characterize Ananias and other heroes in the bible we read of:

“Here I am, Lord.”
