- ₁₁From Troas we put out to sea and sailed straight for Samothrace, and the next day on to Neapolis. ₁₂From there we travelled to Philippi, a Roman colony and the leading city of that district of Macedonia. And we stayed there several days.
- 13On the Sabbath we went outside the city gate to the river, where we expected to find a place of prayer. We sat down and began to speak to the women who had gathered there. 14One of those listening was a woman named Lydia, a dealer in purple cloth from the city of Thyatira, who was a worshiper of God. The Lord opened her heart to respond to Paul's message. 15When she and the members of her household were baptized, she invited us to her home. "If you consider me a believer in the Lord," she said, "come and stay at my house." And she persuaded us.

Sermon Lydia's choice - Rachel Johnson

Today we're continuing with our journey through Acts but to start with I want you to cast your minds back to the day a rich young man came to ask Jesus a question – "what must I do to inherit eternal life?"

We heard the story earlier in our first reading. It ended with the young man walking away from Jesus, unwilling to let go of his wealth and status and security. Jesus then came out with one of his most well-known sayings: "It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God."

Now let's imagine the story went like this instead.

A rich woman of unknown age ran up to Jesus and fell on her knees before him. "Good teacher," she asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?"

"You know the commandments', Jesus answered, 'You shall not murder, you shall not commit adultery, you shall not steal or lie or cheat, honour your father and mother.'"

"Teacher," she declared, "I try my best every day but these are hard commands to keep."

Jesus looked at her and loved her. "Go", he declared, "gather everything you have and use it to build the kingdom of God on earth. Then come, follow me."

At this the woman went away rejoicing for she had a fine home into which she could welcome God's people, and much wealth that she could use to feed the poor, and she knew many people, from all walks of life, with whom she could share the wonderful news that she had found her Saviour.

And Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, "Truly I tell you, this woman has done what many said was impossible, for she loves me more

than she loves money."



This story is imaginary, but the woman isn't. She's called Lydia and she comes from Thyatira, a prosperous Greek city in modern-day Turkey. Thyatira is famous for producing dyes, especially purple dye. Lydia herself is a seller of luxury purple cloth. She's now living in

Philippi, a flourishing Roman colony in Macedonia – modern-day Greece. Presumably she's moved there in search of new markets for her purple cloth. So she's a successful businesswoman – ambitious, prosperous, well connected – think Deborah Meaden from Dragon's Den or Karren Brady from The Apprentice. And she's independent – she owns her own home and controls the household, she doesn't seem to be under the authority of a man. But she's perhaps also something of an outsider – she's a woman in a man's world, she's a foreigner, she worships the God of a minority religion. So I wonder what she's searching for. Eternal life? Security? Or just a place to belong?

Paul has come to Philippi in response to his vision of a man from Macedonia calling for his help. Now typically, when Paul arrives in a new city he goes to the local synagogue to preach to the Jewish community, but it seems that there isn't a synagogue in Philippi. No matter. Paul knows that when there's no synagogue Jews often gather by water so on the Sabbath he goes down to the river to find the Jews of Philippi. And there he meets not a man from Macedonia but a woman – Lydia.

You know, I never really thought about why Lydia was down there at the river – I just took it for granted that she'd go and find a place to pray on the Sabbath with her fellow Jews. But actually, it's not at all certain that Lydia's of Jewish descent so the Sabbath laws might not have such a strong hold on her. It would be easy for her to think to herself, "hmm, Saturday, that's a busy day in the market, lots of trade to be done, important people to schmooze with.....maybe I'll fit in some prayers later on". But no. Lydia sets her business aside to go and pray.



Thinking about Lydia reminded me of Gary Grant, the founder of The Entertainer chain of toy stores. If you've ever walked past one of his shops on a Sunday you might have noticed they're always closed and that's because Gary Grant is a Christian who made the decision to keep his shops closed on Sundays to give his staff a day of rest. I don't know if that was an easy decision for him or something, he wrestled with but, like Lydia, he chose to put God before profits. Take a

moment to consider just how extraordinary that choice is. As extraordinary as a camel fitting through the eye of a needle.

Going back to Lydia, we see that choice bearing fruit as it leads her to a life-changing encounter with Paul. The Holy Spirit opens her heart to

receive Paul's gospel message and she finds everything she wanted not in the purple cloth trade nor in the law of the Old Covenant but in Christ crucified. So, Lydia and her household are baptised, the first converts on European soil.

Now you might be thinking it's not fair to compare Lydia with the rich young man in our first reading – as far as we know Paul never told her to give away all her worldly goods or she might have thought twice. But actually, Lydia doesn't need telling. Her first instinct is to use her wealth to help others. Just look at how she implores Paul and his companions to accept hospitality in her home. And later on we read that the brothers and sisters, the founding members of the Philippian church, are meeting in her home, just as we saw a couple of weeks ago the church meeting in Mary's home. Right from the start Lydia is using her wealth to bless God's people and grow his kingdom. In this sermon series we've looked at other generous people in the early church – as well as Mary there was Barnabas who sold his field and Tabitha who made clothes for the poor. But the Philippian church is particularly known for its generosity and I wonder if this is down to Lydia's influence as a founding member of the church.

We've heard two stories this morning. One is the story of a person who clung onto the luxury and power and status and security of worldly wealth and failed to recognise what was truly precious. The other is the story of an extraordinary person who held their wealth lightly enough to be able to grasp hold of Jesus, who used that wealth to be a blessing and who found an eternal home in the kingdom of God. Which story do you want to be yours to be?
