Bible readings

Luke 24:13-25 ~ Kay Dodds, St Mark's

¹³Now that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem. ¹⁴They were talking with each other about everything that had happened. ¹⁵As they talked and discussed these things with each other, Jesus himself came up and walked along with them; ¹⁶but they were kept from recognizing him. ¹⁷He asked them, "What are you discussing together as you walk along?"

18They stood still, their faces downcast. One of them, named Cleopas, asked him, "Are you only a visitor to Jerusalem and do not know the things that have happened there in these days?"

19"What things?" he asked.

20"About Jesus of Nazareth," they replied. "He was a prophet, powerful in word and deed before God and all the people. The chief priests and our rulers handed him over to be sentenced to death, and they crucified him; 21but we had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel. And what is more, it is the third day since all this took place. 22In addition, some of our women amazed us. They went to the tomb early this morning 23but didn't find his body. They came and told us that they had seen a vision of angels, who said he was alive. 24Then some of our companions went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but him they did not see."

²³After spending some time in Antioch, Paul set out from there and travelled from place to place throughout the region of Galatia and Phrygia, strengthening all the disciples. ²⁴Meanwhile a Jew named Apollos, a native of Alexandria, came to Ephesus. He was a learned man, with a thorough knowledge of the Scriptures. ²⁵He had been instructed in the way of the Lord, and he spoke with great fervour and taught about Jesus accurately, though he knew only the baptism of John.

²⁶He began to speak boldly in the synagogue. When Priscilla and Aquila heard him, they invited him to their home and explained to him the way of God more adequately. ²⁷When Apollos wanted to go to Achaia, the brothers encouraged him and wrote to the disciples there to welcome him. On arriving, he was a great help to those who by grace had believed. ²⁸For he vigorously refuted the Jews in public debate, proving from the Scriptures that Jesus was the Christ.

Sermon "A humble man" -Mick Moorse

Just in case you are saying or thinking — Who is this strange old man? — I'll introduce myself. My name is Mick Moorse — I have been a member of the church, particularly St Mark's for the past 50 years or so; 20 years ago I was ordained as a local ordained minister, as such I functioned for about 10 years, then things in my life became difficult and I no longer function as an ordained minister although

my name does appear in Notes & news. So I'm very glad that Jonathan has given me this opportunity.

If I said I was going to speak about Apollo the name might strike some bells, perhaps you would think of the Greek god or the theatre in

London. But if I said Apollos you might think I had made a mistake, that is unless you were listening carefully to the sermon last Sunday. So we continue with the series about ordinary Christians doing extraordinary things, today we are considering Apollos.



We read of him briefly in the book of Acts and he gets mentioned in some of Paul's letters. You will also get some information about him if you google him. But as most of the info comes from the new testament, we'll stick with that. So what do we know about him? He was a Jew and he came from the city of Alexandria in Egypt, where there was a thriving Jewish community. At some stage he had come into contact with the Christian community there and had joined them, becoming a Christian himself. He may have had a job that necessitated travelling, we read of him first in Ephesus situated in what is now Turkey but we know that he went to Corinth and Crete.

What else do we know about him?

He was very clever, knew the Hebrew Bible – our Old Testament well, and was a good speaker. As one translation puts it he was eloquent, we read also "he taught accurately and he spoke with burning enthusiasm". So to sum up Apollos was well travelled, clever, eloquent and enthusiastic. So although he was an ordinary Christian, in many was he was not an ordinary person.

As a Jew, wherever he was he attended the synagogue, this he did when he was in Ephesus; as a visitor he was invited to speak so he took the opportunity to speak about Jesus as the promised Messiah, we read "he taught accurately about things concerning Jesus;" and he did so fervently.

Among those listening was a couple of Christian Jews – they were the subject of last weeks sermon, 'the all-rounders' as Jonathan called them Priscilla & Aquila. They were pleased to hear him speak about Jesus and argue the case for Christianity, but they realised that there was something missing in



his message. We don't know exactly what it was, but it seems that it was about baptism because we are told, "he only knew of the baptism of John, a baptism of repentance. So Priscilla & Aquila took him quietly to one side, at their home "and explained the way of God more accurately", so that he understood the full gospel. End of story. But was it easy for Apollos?

Here was a very gifted man, who put his reputation on the line, and chose to go to the very people who were likely to be hostile, and we are told that he spoke boldly. Surely he deserved nothing but praise. He could have taken offence at Priscilla & Aquila and said to himself — what are they anyway — just tent makers. What people are, often colours our opinion of them and what they say and our readiness to listen to them. Jesus found this when He went to his hometown of Nazareth, they didn't take much notice of what he said or did. Why? Because in their eyes he

was just a carpenter. You don't listen to carpenters - or tent makers when they talk about things outside of their field of expertise. But Apollos listened. He didn't look at what they were but who they were. He was ready therefore to hear what God had to say through them. He not only listened but took on board what they had to say. Therefore that is why they were able to send him on his way; when he moved on to Corinth, with a letter commending him to the church there. So here was a very gifted ordinary Christian who showed, I think, extra-ordinary humility taking notice, of a couple of tent-makers. There is further reference to him in Paul's letter to the Corinthians where Paul speaks very appreciatively of him. Also he was quite popular certainly with some members of the church there because in the letter Paul and another group says "I belong to Apollos". Paul then goes onto write "I planted", "Apollos watered" but "God gave the increase". Apollos also gets a brief mention in the letter to Titus so in his travels he must have gone to Crete. We know a lot about Paul but hardly anything about Apollos. Why?

Paul wrote a lot, much of it makes up our New Testament, but is this the full explanation? I think part of the explanation is in the words "Apollos watered", taught and nurtured. When I left school I worked at

Wisley Gardens in the glass department.
Watering was regarded as so important that at first I was not allowed to do it – there was no such thing as automatic watering then. The visitors often admired the plants,



particularly in the display houses, but I never heard anyone say what a good job the waterers did or ask "I wonder who does the watering?" Apollos was a waterer, a very important job but often taken for granted and not noticed.

Yet another example of Apollos' humility. He was a very good public speaker, eloquent and fervent and in an age when the opportunity to hear someone speak well about a subject was a form of entertainment; Apollos had the ability to draw large crowds, he could have made a lot of money like the stand up comedians of today, however he chose to use his gifts serving God by teaching the Christians of Corinth. In fact Apollos provides us with an example of true humility. When Priscilla & Aquila

approached him, he didn't get on his high horse but humbly accepted what they had to say. Secondly he was ready to use his many outstanding talents serving others in a capacity that gave no glory or even recognition. Here was an ordinary Christian showing extraordinary humility. He was a very clever, eloquent, enthusiastic, yet humble person. Like Jesus – An example to us all.

Incidentally the ancient Greek word which in our bibles is usually translated as humility, was often used to describe big powerful animals such as horses or elephants which potentially could hurt human beings but use that strength and power to pull or lift heavy loads. – So true humility is using Power, status, position, talents or abilities in the service of others.

Let us pray - O Lord, Keep us from all self-confidence give us the grace of true humility and self-forgetfulness, help us in this respect to be like Apollos and above all like Jesus - in whose name we ask it. Amen
