This Sunday is our mission Sunday in the parish dedicated to Cherith, who is one of our mission partners working with Church army as an Evangelist in Liverpool. It's been very encouraging to hear that Inspite of Covid–19 and all the restrictions it has brought about on gatherings, Cherith has managed to carry on proclaiming Christ via the wonders of Zoom. In the last month alone, she has managed to lead a very successful summer play scheme that had over 50 families attend, she currently runs a toddler church once a week with between 15 to 20 families attending, and she is still doing assemblies in atleast three schools via Zoom and other prerecorded material that is played during these assemblies. Like many of us, she is grateful that technology has enabled mission to carry on, using it to witness and disciple God's people

Bible readings

Mark 16.15-18 ~ Rosemary McCrum (St Marks)

¹⁵ He said to them, 'Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation. ¹⁶ Whoever believes and is baptised will be saved, but whoever does not believe will be condemned. ¹⁷ And these signs will accompany those who believe: in my name they will drive out demons; they will speak in new tongues; ¹⁸ they will pick up snakes with their hands; and when they drink deadly poison, it will not hurt them at all; they will place their hands on people who are ill, and they will get well.'

Acts 28.16-31

¹⁶When we got to Rome, Paul was allowed to live by himself, with a soldier to guard him.

¹⁷Three days later he called together the local Jewish leaders. When they had assembled, Paul said to them: 'My brothers, although I have done nothing against our people or against the customs of our ancestors, I was arrested in Jerusalem and handed over to the Romans. ¹⁸ They examined me and wanted to release me, because I was not guilty of any crime deserving death. ¹⁹ The Jews objected, so I was compelled to make an appeal to Caesar. I certainly did not intend to bring any charge against my own people. ²⁰ For this reason I have asked to see you and talk with you. It is because of the hope of Israel that I am bound with this chain.' ²¹ They replied, 'We have not received any letters from Judea concerning you, and none of our people who have come from there has reported or said anything bad about you. ²² But we want to hear what your views are, for we know that people everywhere are talking against this sect.' ²³ They arranged to meet Paul on a certain day, and came in even larger numbers to the place where he was staying. He witnessed to them from morning till evening, explaining about the kingdom of God, and from the Law of Moses and from the Prophets he tried to persuade them about Jesus. ²⁴ Some were convinced by what he said, but others would not believe. ²⁵ They disagreed among themselves and began to leave after Paul had made this final statement: 'The Holy Spirit spoke the truth to your ancestors when he said through Isaiah the prophet:

²⁶ "Go to this people and say,
'You will be ever hearing but never understanding; you will be ever seeing but never perceiving.'
²⁷ For this people's heart has become calloused; they hardly hear with their ears, and they have closed their eyes.
Otherwise they might see with their eyes, hear with their ears, understand with their hearts
and turn, and I would heal them."
²⁸ 'Therefore I want you to know that God's salvation

²⁸ 'Therefore I want you to know that God's salvation has been sent to the Gentiles, and they will listen!' ³⁰ For two whole years Paul stayed there in his own rented house and welcomed all who came to see him. ³¹He proclaimed the kingdom of God and taught about the Lord Jesus Christ – with all boldness and without hindrance!

<u>Sermon</u> Acts 28.16–31 What happens next?

My favourite part of the TV programme 'A Question of Sport' was the 'What happened next?' part, though I don't think they have it on the show regularly now. A clip of a football match or a tennis game or a horse race is shown and then paused at a key moment and the contestants have to guess what happens next? Usually it is someone falling over



spectacularly or getting hit by a ball or an animal entering the field of play.

Good novels and biographies keep you reading because you want to know what happens next, especially those page-turners that keep you up far too late. The book of Acts is a compelling story of life after Jesus' return to heaven as the church is born and the kingdom of God grows across the Roman empire. We have looked at many of the lesser, more ordinary characters over the summer and now are looking at the extraordinary person of Paul, finding out what happens next as he went on trial before Felix, Festus and Agrippa and then appealed to Caesar and heads for Rome. Last week we saw how he was God's reassuring presence in the terrible storm that ultimately led to the shipwreck off Malta, with the miracle of everyone surviving. And now as we read from the very last chapter of Acts we are looking for an exciting conclusion and an encouraging ending as Paul arrives at Rome waiting to see Caesar, emperor Nero himself, who will decide his fate.

As we will see later, the very end of Acts may feel a bit of an anti-climax, as if leaving the story open for a sequel. In the meantime we see Paul being put under house arrest on arrival in Rome with a reasonable amount of freedom as he awaits an audience with the emperor. Paul being Paul wastes no time in meeting with the local Jewish leaders for an opportunity to share with them that Jesus is their long awaited Messiah. They had not particularly heard of Paul, but had heard of this 'sect' who believed Jesus was the Messiah and wanted to know more.

So Paul uses their scriptures to explain how Jesus fulfilled its prophecies and many were convinced and came to faith. However, as always, many did not believe. Paul then quotes from Isaiah 6:9–10, a passage that Jesus quotes after giving the parable of the sower. The quote is made to indicate how many people, like the seed sown on the path or rocky or weedy ground in the parable, will never turn their hearts towards God's truth, however much they hear his word or see God's works in action, because it costs too much, they would have to repent, change and turn from their self-centred ways.

I'm sure we all know family members or friends who have been exposed to God's truth for many years, who we have shared our faith with in detail, but who have never made that commitment to follow Christ. It's hard for us to bear and can be discouraging, but the bible tells us it will happen even when people are exposed to great evangelists like Paul and even Jesus himself didn't convert everyone he met. Our role is to be faithful in our witness, through our words and actions and to be persistent in prayer for them.

Paul's last recorded words to these Jewish leaders and in the book of Acts are how God's salvation in Jesus is now going to be proclaimed actively to the Gentiles where the ground is fertile. Much of the book of Acts covers the problems this caused many of the Jewish believers in the early church, because they had always understood that salvation was just for the Jews. But Paul knew that the way to salvation was open to everyone, and always had been as he frequently quoted scripture to show this, and he had been proclaiming the gospel to Jew and Gentile alike without discrimination.

I'm sure we all believe that the gospel is for everyone. That everyone, no matter what race or religion they are, what background they come from, what terrible things they may have done in the past can know salvation though Jesus. But the question I often ask myself is what am I doing about sharing my faith with those who are very different to me. At one level it is easier to speak of my faith to people who have had a Christian upbringing or have the same values as me, because they have the background of faith, although they can be overfamiliar or complacent with faith and keep their hearts closed. But it is usually significantly harder for me to share my faith with someone of a much younger generation, or from another religious upbringing, or who only know Jesus as a swear word, because I don't know how to explain my faith to them. And so I make no effort to do so, it is too hard. I am worried I will make a fool of myself so I do nothing. And as a parish it is much easier to run groups for people like us rather than trying to reach out to the unchurched and the marginalised. That's why we started up Messy church, Refresh Café, the Light event at Hallowe'en. It can be slow going drawing people to faith who are so different to us, but they are the 'Gentiles' of our day and we, as individuals, and a parish are called to share Jesus' good news with them.

Luke ends his tales of the early church in the book of Acts with Paul under house arrest for two years telling us how he boldly preached the good news of Jesus, welcoming all who came to hear this amazing man speak of an even more amazing man. That's great, but I really want to know what happens next. Does Paul get to meet emperor Nero? If so what does he say to him? Does he proclaim Jesus to Nero? (I'm sure he does, he did with all the other top ranking people he met – Felix, Festus, King Agrippa etc) How does Nero react?

Unfortunately we don't know, we have no writings around that tell us this, although piecing together church history it seems that Paul was released (after meeting Nero?) because he wrote letters 2 Timothy and Titus at a later date. He was probably rearrested and then eventually executed for his faith. We don't quite know why Luke ended the book of Acts as he did without giving us the story of Paul meeting emperor Nero, though it may well be that he wrote it whilst with Paul in Rome as an account of what had led Paul to that point and either never got the chance to write the rest or didn't feel he needed to add any more. After all it is fitting that the story of the growth of the church through the power of the Holy Spirit, as Acts is, should come from an insignificant backwater of the Roman empire, Judea, to the centre of that mighty empire itself, Rome. This is not a small sect that would burn out after a few years – and there were many of them – but the Kingdom of God growing in size, breadth and stature that would one day become the official religion of the Roman empire when Emperor Constantine was converted and ultimately spread to all corners of the globe.

So what happens next is the stories of millions of ordinary followers of Jesus over 20 centuries living out their faith in Christ and slowly changing the whole world just as Jesus said would happen. You and me are part of that continuing story and the book of Acts gives us a great example of how we improvise our part in the script. We are empowered by the Holy Spirit, inspired by the scriptures and supported by our fellow Christians to live out the good news of Jesus through loving acts of kindness, a passion for justice, bringing physical and emotional healing to people and telling people that there is a God who loves them so much that he came down to earth to save them and give them hope.

Whatever is going on in your life right now, however you are affected by Coronavirus, what can you do with the gifts, resources and time you have to follow the example of Paul and the other characters in Acts so that you can shape for the glory of God what happens next?
