Christ crucified is God's power and wisdom

₁₈For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. ₁₉For it is written:

'I will destroy the wisdom of the wise; the intelligence of the intelligent I will frustrate.'

where is the wise person? Where is the teacher of the law? Where is the philosopher of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? 21For since in the wisdom of God the world through its wisdom did not know him, God was pleased through the foolishness of what was preached to save those who believe. 22Jews demand signs and Greeks look for wisdom, 23but we preach Christ crucified: a stumbling-block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, 24but to those whom God has called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. 25For the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than human strength.

₂₆Brothers and sisters, think of what you were when you were called. Not many of you were wise by human standards; not many were

influential; not many were of noble birth. ₂₇But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong. ₂₈God chose the lowly things of this world and the despised things – and the things that are not – to nullify the things that are, ₂₉so that no one may boast before him. ₃₀It is because of him that you are in Christ Jesus, who has become for us wisdom from God – that is, our righteousness, holiness and redemption.

31Therefore, as it is written: 'Let the one who boasts boast in the Lord.'

And so it was with me, brothers and sisters. When I came to you, I did not come with eloquence or human wisdom as I proclaimed to you the testimony about God. ₂For I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ and him crucified. ₃I came to you in weakness with great fear and trembling. ₄My message and my preaching were not with wise and persuasive words, but with a demonstration of the Spirit's power, ₅so that your faith might not rest on human wisdom, but on God's power.

Sermon - Jonathan Worldly wise? 1 Corinthians 1:18-2:5

Can you think back to your childhood? For most of us it feels a long time ago! Do you remember sitting in front of the TV all morning on a wet day, feeling as miserable as the weather, and your mum saying 'Come on, get your waterproofs and wellies on, let's go for a walk.' You think she is crazy. Why would you want to be going out in the rain when you could be watching Noel Edmond's Multi-coloured swapshop? But you have to, so you slowly, grudgingly get changed and venture out. And before long you are splashing in the puddles, twirling your umbrella and having fun. And when you come home having had fresh air and a good time your mum says 'That was fun wasn't it?' You don't admit that it was, but you feel much better for it and you know, annoyingly, that your mum was right again!

Some things just don't seem to make sense, at least at the time, do they? But later, usually with experience, we realise why. Last month we were looking at the apostle Paul's life, his total dedication to proclaiming the good news of Jesus in all its fullness. During October and November we are looking at some of Paul's key messages in his letters that are at the heart of the gospel, starting with generosity last week and today thinking about the power of the cross and how foolish it seems to many.

I'm sure most of us have experienced the apathy or looks of bewilderment or statement that we are mad when we explain to our non-Christian

friends why we are Christians and why the death of Jesus on the cross is so important to us. In an age of self-help and personal truth people can't understand why we need a saviour, especially a dead one who allegedly was God. It's total foolishness, but our friends are usually too polite to say so, though much of the media has no problem stating it indirectly or even directly.

And as we see from Paul's letter to the Corinthians it was the same 2000 years ago. In chapter 1 v20 he lists the wise (the philosophers of his day), the scribe (the Jewish scholar and wise academic), the debater (the orator with well reasoned argument); people who epitomised education, wisdom, knowledge and were the ones everyone looked up to, who thought they knew everything.

The Greeks were very reasoned people, famous for their philosophers who devised philosophies, which were essentially religious, that provided explanations of the universe and offered salvation through human reason and wisdom. Although there were many different philosophies, they were all essentially dualistic – i.e. they saw a sharp distinction between the physical and mental reality. The physical world and the human body were temporary and evil, while the mind and soul were immortal and good, but trapped in the physical.

So the good news of Jesus that Paul proclaimed was foolish to the Greeks, because salvation came not through reason and the mind, the things they held so high, but through a physical act, which they considered worthless. That physical act was the bodily death and resurrection of a convicted criminal from a despised race in a far-off corner of the empire. And it was that physical act which was supposed to have overturned the spiritual realm. Madness. Pure madness.

And the Jews found Paul's message foolish too. In fact they found it a stumbling-block, "something that trips people up", because they were expecting a victorious Messiah who would bring about a physical rescue from pagan masters and return their people to Godly Jewish rule. Not a Messiah who was seemingly defeated and executed by their pagan masters, and then even if he did come back to life disappeared again soon after.

The wisdom of the Greek world was imparted by eloquent rhetoric, well-crafted words, a showy style that would entertain the reader or listeners, make people stand up and take notice. Of course we have it today through media-savvy spin doctors, politicians highly trained in public speaking,

TV presenters with a gift of the gab and comedians who hold us in the palm of their hand as they speak about the cause they are highlighting. None of it is necessarily wrong, but they persuade us more with their style than their content.

In v17, just before the passage Paul explains it thus: "For Christ did not send me to baptize but to preach the gospel, and not with words of eloquent wisdom, lest the cross of Christ be emptied of its power". Paul wanted the cross to be what it was all about, not beautiful rhetoric, or magnetic personalities giving subliminal messages. The cross does its own work. Telling the story of Christ has its own power – some will see it as weak and foolish, but he knows that in fact it is strong and wise. God knows what he is doing. He likes to use things that many perceive as 'foolish', because then following Jesus is not about being cool, but about genuine conviction. As Paul says in v27–29 God chose the weak and foolish and despised things in the eyes of the world so that no–one can boast in themselves, their abilities, their wisdom, their brilliance, they can only boast in Christ.

Paul had no illusions about the reactions the gospel would elicit. Proclaiming the good news of Christ, to Jew or Greek, invited people to mock and call it foolishness, because it didn't rely on human wisdom, on us being able to sort ourselves out. And it is the same today. It doesn't seem to make sense. Because it is about death bringing life, the last being first, the poor being rich, and true power coming not in physical might or superior human reason, but in the Holy Spirit bringing love, forgiveness, humility and peace. It doesn't conform to our reason.

It wasn't fashionable then, nor is it now, to say that we are all sinners. That we're not fully in control of our actions and our words, that we often mess up our life and other people's. We don't mean to, we try our best, it's not that bad. And this unfashionable message says that we cannot redeem ourselves. Sure we can try, we can find ways to feel better about ourselves. We can volunteer or give money to a charity, we can join self-help groups, we can make some difference to the world around us, but ultimately we still get it wrong, we all fall short of perfection, God's standard. We need a saviour, someone to rescue us from ourselves. We try and be our own saviour, or find a friend or group to do it for us, and we get so far, but ultimately they don't satisfy, something still niggles inside us.

But the good news of Jesus comes from the source of all life, who made us and really knows us – how we tick, why we sin, how we can be made whole again. And as v18 says, while the cross might be foolishness to a world that knows it all and thinks it can find the answer to all the problems of the world in human knowledge and human goodness, to those who are in the ongoing process of being saved, accepting that we can't sort ourselves out, the cross is the power of God. The power of a loving heavenly father, who is the only one who has the power to forgive us, change our hearts and help us understand what life is truly about.

When people come to Christ in repentance, when they give up on themselves being master of their own life, when they trust God to forgive them and lead their lives, things change. Lives change. Situations change.

Like Nicky, a single lady who loved drinking, smoking, partying and bringing men back to her flat. She enjoyed life and was very closed to her sisters, all Christians, who spoke about their faith in Jesus. But when 9/11 happened she started asking questions and was invited to church by a friend. She went to tell Christians how stupid they were in believing in a God who could let 9/11 happen, but she kept going back and became drawn in by the compelling person of Jesus. On Sunday when hearing a sermon about entering by the narrow gate she felt she was at a crossroads and had to choose either to carry on down the broad way, living life as she always had, but which she realised ultimately led to a dark and fearful place or choose the harder, unfamiliar narrow way of Jesus. A few days later she prayed, asking God to forgive her for going her own way for so long, acknowledging that she was scared of this new unknown way. Life hasn't been easy for her since, but she knows that Jesus died for her, loves her and brings light to her in those dark places. And we all have stories of the power of the cross for us.

The phrase "worldly wise" is generally used as a complement. It shows someone knows how the world works, they can take care of themselves, make money and do well. But God's wisdom, epitomised by the cross, is other-worldly wise and often at odds with the 'wisdom' of this world. That is a challenge for us as Christians, especially when we think about sharing our faith. We rightly want to make our faith relevant to non-Christians, so that our language of faith and our lifestyles are not a stumbling block to them even hearing what we have to say. But we must not water down the message of the gospel, that we are all sinners in need of a saviour. A saviour who came in the person of Jesus who was crucified

on our behalf out of his immense love for us, but requires us to respond to this costly, gracious act.

The message of the cross is powerful, but foolish. Our role is to proclaim it in words and actions, whatever people think, because we know its true power, and the cross and will do its own work, in its own time through the power of the Holy Spirit transforming lives.
