⁶For I am already being poured out like a drink offering, and the time has come for my departure. ⁷I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. ⁸Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day--and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for his appearing.

₉Do your best to come to me quickly, ₁₀for Demas, because he loved this world, has deserted me and has gone to Thessalonica. Crescens has gone to Galatia, and Titus to Dalmatia. ₁₁Only Luke is with me. Get Mark and bring him with you, because he is helpful to me in my ministry. ¹²I sent Tychicus to Ephesus. ₁₃When you come, bring the cloak that I left with Carpus at Troas, and my scrolls, especially the parchments.

Sermon Rachel Johnson

2. Tim 4.6-18, John 14.1-6

Can you think of a time when you've felt weary? Not the satisfying weariness you feel after an afternoon of gardening or a 5K run, but the sort of weariness where you wake up and wonder how you'll make it through another day of this pandemic let alone another 6 months, where you wonder if your hands will have the strength to make a cup of tea, where you count the minutes until your next dose of painkillers and even choosing what to have for lunch feels like too big a decision.

When I read this passage from 2 Timothy that's how weary Paul seems to me. He's not the Paul who preached with such fire and passion, or the Paul who exhorted the Corinthians to run in such a way as to win the prize. He's not even the Paul who's torn between his desire to be with Christ and his desire to continue doing God's work on earth. This Paul is cold and lonely, stuck in a Roman prison cell and facing execution. All his zeal and energy have been poured out like a drink offering. Imprisonment and suffering never stopped him before but now he's almost empty. If we use Paul's analogy of a race, he's collapsed in an exhausted heap just before the finish line. How can he carry on? How do we carry on in the face of our own frailty, exhaustion, despair, depression, burnout? Isaiah writes 'those who hope in the LORD will renew their strength' but what does that look like?

Let's see what Paul's doing to combat his weariness. Firstly he looks back at his own life. Looking back can be bittersweet, can't it? A mixture of good memories and regrets and frustration at what we can't do any more. But as Paul looks back he's able to say, 'I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith.' How wonderful to be able to say that. Doubtless he's made mistakes but he's remained faithful to Christ ever since that day on the road to Damascus and he can see how Christ has remained faithful to him. Paul is running this race in Christ's strength just as he always has done.

Next, Paul looks to his present situation and he does several important things here. First, he accepts that he can't carry on preaching and pastoring his churches— it's time to pass the baton on to Timothy. That's not to say his ministry is at an end but it has changed. Secondly, he asks for help. He doesn't let pride hold him back, he's not embarrassed to be vulnerable, he doesn't think that Timothy's got more important things to do, he needs help and he asks for it. And thirdly, he hands over the burden of his grievances and regrets to the Lord. All this reminds me of what Jesus said to those who are weary and burdened – 'come to me and I will give you rest'. It might sound strange to start talking about rest in the middle of a race but maybe that's because we're misunderstanding what this race is all about. Paul would be the first to say that the race isn't about achieving great things and earning a prize – Jesus has already won that for us. The race is just another way of expressing the baptism charge – 'remain faithful to Christ to the end of your life'. And part of being faithful means turning to Christ when we need rest.

Finally, Paul looks ahead to his future. For years he's been longing to see Jesus face to face and now that prize is drawing closer. More than anything, it's this vision of eternal life with Christ that gives Paul the hope he needs to carry on and finish the race. He knows that Christ has prepared a place for him and one day this prison cell will be a fleeting memory, nothing at all compared to the surpassing greatness of being with Christ. Hope is the lifeline that will take him safely over the finish line.

Fear, despair, guilt, regret – these things whisper to us 'you can't trust God', 'you're useless, God doesn't want you', 'covid-19's never going to be over, might as well give up now'. They weigh us down and try to lure us out of the race and away from God. Paul whispers to us 'bring those burdens to Jesus and he will take them from you', 'come to God in your weakness and he will give you the strength to get through today', 'fix your eyes on the hope God has promised and it will guide you home.'

One more thing before I finish; a few years ago I was watching Kingfield school sports day and the final race was twice round the sports field. As most of the children were heading into the home strait one girl was struggling; she'd fallen way behind. And her friend ran back to her, took her by the hand and they crossed the finish line together. May we be like those two girls, giving and receiving help, being Christ to each other and fixing our eyes on the hope that's set before us.
