Sermon Sam Waako - Paul's values

Romans 16.1-27, Mark 12.28-31

From our main Bible reading this week (Rom 16.1–27), it's my aim in this talk to share some of what I believe were the core values that were very important to the Apostle Paul. In this chapter, we find one of those texts that one can easily skip over, not only for the difficulty to pronounce some of the names Paul mentions, but for what comes before this chapter in the book of Romans. Prior to this, Paul writes to the people of Rome about wonderful things such as the righteousness of God being revealed in Christ, and justification by grace through faith and freedom from sin and condemnation and a glorious hope for the future. And so when you come to this chapter, it's quite easy to skip over it for what initially looks like

measly greetings. But let us not forget Paul's words to Timothy, "All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness..." And this text too is God's word, and as we are about to find out, very useful for teaching and encouragement especially.

Paul was a brilliant theologian, considered a prodigy at a young age, very educated and an extremely clever man. But in this final chapter of Roman's, we see Paul put that and 'his office/calling' on one side and we see him 'speak' from the heart. And in doing so, we get a glimpse of Paul the man and not Paul the Apostle. And when we do that, we are able to see some of the things that really mattered to him on a personal and almost intimate level. In my preparation for this talk, I was able to pick out 10 things in this text alone that I think were at the core of his values. But for the sake of time among other things, I will highlight only four of those values that I believe were top of the list.

1) Paul was very relational (People mattered)

Paul in Romans 16 lists a long list of names, some easier to read than others. Most of these people Paul had met on his missionary journey's. Take for example priscilla and Aquila, who we studied a couple of months ago. Chances are he hadn't spent much time with some of these people, but it's rather amazing that he remembers them by name. To Paul, we learn that names matter. Am sure we all agree that it's such a good feeling when one remembers your name especially when you don't expect them to. And in addition to this, Paul longs to be with these people, because that's what the kingdom of God is all about, relationship. Something many of us have sadly missed during Covid. In addition to this, this list of names shows the sheer diversity of Paul's relationships. Paul here sends greetings to no less than 26 individuals, 2 families and 3 churches. This list includes Roman's and Greeks, Jews and Gentiles, Men and Women, prominent citizens and prisoners, it crosses lines of gender, race and class. Paul's greeting alone is an indication of his love ~ love that shows no preference. If we are to call ourselves relational people and that people matter, i wonder if our relationships reflect the diversity especially of the body of Christ!

2) Paul valued Women's Ministry (Women Mattered)

I have heard a number of people in the past refer to Paul as a misogynist, which is sad and completely far from the truth. Chances are, these are the same people who skip over scriptural texts like Romans 16. In the last few months, I have studied the life of Paul, and it doesn't take

one long to realise how much he valued women's ministry especially in the early Church. In this text alone, we are introduced to Phoebe, who not only did Paul trust to deliver this important letter to Rome (I think the most important of letters he ever wrote), but Paul referred to her as 'servant', which in Greek translates 'deacon' or in Phoebe's case, 'deaconess.' And by doing this, Paul is affirming Phoebe to be his fellow co-worker, just like any other male co-workers with him in proclaiming Christ.

Looking back (and at present) at my own faith journey, am ever so grateful for the women who have imparted and continue to nurture living faith in my life. Among them, my mother, who not only taught me to pray and read the Bible, but took me to Church every Sunday without fail, whether I wanted to go or not. Then a young lady at the time by the names of Rebecca who introduced me to a youth club, where I gained my first ministry experience. And now my wife Lyz who am so blessed to copartner with in this calling. And am also ever so encouraged by the national Church in every effort they are making to increase women ordinands within the Anglican community. The Church needs the ministry of Women.

3) Affirmation and Encouragement

I think it's fair to say that to begin with, Paul was not known for encouragement and affirmation. Paul in his early years of ministry was about vision, and went about it radically, which a number of times we read especially from Luke/Acts caused division. But having spent a lot of time in Barnabas company, Paul's life was changed in this area. Barnabas was a gifted encourager to the point that he was referred to as the 'son of encouragement.' And Paul being a constant learner, we see this important trait rubbing off on him and him using it especially in his letters to the different churches. Someone once said, 'the secret fuel of the Church is encouragement.' And for me, this has been specifically true during this pandemic. The encouragement (in its many forms) we (ministry team) have received since this pandemic broke has been immensely appreciated by everyone. Personally, it's one of those things that keep you going even when the going is quite difficult.

4) Unity in Christ (Unity mattered)

V5 of Romans 16 says, "...the Church that meets at their house.." This phrase gives us a glimpse into the organisation of the early Church in a city like Rome with a slightly large Christian community, where there would be several 'congregations' meeting in different houses, since there

was no 'church' building at the time. It's thought that each house where these congregations met each had a 'pastor' (not necessarily owner of the home). And in this chapter, we see Paul writing to encourage Unity among all these Churches that were congregating in homes. Paul goes on to appeal to these congregations to watch out for those who cause division especially by their false teaching with the aim of sowing discord among the congregations in Rome. You would have thought that now over 2000 years since then, we shouldn't be having this issue in the Church today. But we sadly still do. The church continues to be divided when don't see each other as one body of Christ with different parts, but rather see each other as competitors, hence the jealousy, gossip, and all sorts of things that cause divisions. And we sadly forget that just like in Rome, today, different churches, different denominations is no different from those who met in different homes at the time. Unity was so important to Paul that in Romans alone, he mentions (talks about it) atleast 16 times. Reason being, it's essential to God's purpose for the Church. Paul gives us a stark warning to avoid these divisions and those who cause it.

Whatever values Paul had, whatever mattered to him, it was built on the foundation of Jesus words in Mark 12.28–31, that in summary say, "Love God, Love people." When Paul encountered Jesus on that road to Damascus, his love for God produced an over flow of love for God's people. And whatever values we would love to have or imitate from Paul or be encouraged in, the starting point is Loving God, and out of that over flow we can have a deep and genuine love for God's people.
