Bible readings

2 Samuel 11.1-11,16 ~ Rosemary Titcombe, St Peter's

In the spring, at the time when kings go off to war, David sent Joab out with the king's men and the whole Israelite army. They destroyed the Ammonites and besieged Rabbah. But David remained in Jerusalem.

2One evening David got up from his bed and walked around on the roof of the palace. From the roof he saw a woman bathing. The woman was very beautiful, 3 and David sent someone to find out about her. The man said, "Isn't this Bathsheba, the daughter of Eliam and the wife of Uriah the Hittite?" 4Then David sent messengers to get her. She came to him, and he slept with her. (She had purified herself from her uncleanness.) Then she went back home. 5The woman conceived and sent word to David, saying, "I am pregnant."

₆So David sent this word to Joab: "Send me Uriah the Hittite." And Joab sent him to David. ₇When Uriah came to him, David asked him how Joab was, how the soldiers were and how the war was going. ₈Then David said to Uriah, "Go down to your house and wash your feet." So Uriah left the palace, and a gift from the king was sent after him. ₉But Uriah slept at the entrance to the palace with all his master's servants and did not go down to his house.

10When David was told, "Uriah did not go home," he asked him, "Haven't you just come from a distance? Why didn't you go home?"

uriah said to David, "The ark and Israel and Judah are staying in tents, and my master Joab and my lord's men are camped in the open fields. How could I go to my house to eat and drink and lie with my wife? As surely as you live, I will not do such a thing!"

₁₆So while Joab had the city under siege, he put Uriah at a place where he knew the strongest defenders were.

'Duties and Joy: Celebrating Christmas'

Good Morning to all

Let us pray – may the dutiful righteousness and joy of the love of God be found in my words to you now, and in your listening and understanding of them, as we conclude our Advent sermon series. **Amen**

My Sermon Title this morning is – **Duties and Joys: Celebrating Christmas**

Only five days to go before we celebrate the joy of Christ's birth. As in our Holy Communion at St Peters today, food and drink may be an important part of your celebrations. For some perhaps a fine meal with company, for others simply in raising a glass, although on their own yet always with God.

Sometimes, in a meal, there can be a dissonance, a contrast of flavours, which can be surprising and yet add to its overall enjoyment. For the traditional turkey meal, think perhaps of the gentle smoothness of the bread sauce contrasted with the sharp, almost bitter flavour of the cranberry sauce.

And so it is with the two readings we heard today. Why are they put together in this last Sunday of Advent in Christmas week? What on earth (or in heaven!) can the connection be between them? What is the connection between the sharp flavour of David's very dubious behaviour (to put it mildly) to take possession of Bathsheba, wife of Uriah, with the

gently wonderful story of the annunciation, wherein the virgin Mary (1: 34) gently accepts God's will for her to carry to birth her forthcoming baby Jesus, the Son of God (1:35)?

Like some Christmas mystery game, let's find out more, before later on looking at the joy of celebrating Christmas. I am proposing that there are two important things common to those readings, all under the Will of God. First, dutiful behaviours, and second, a specific connection of ancestry.

What is meant by dutiful is when we, as individuals, accept some form of obligation or responsibility to others, in a moral sense; recognising inside ourselves what is right, or wrong, and that it is required of us. For today I am going to assume we all have our own understanding of what is the 'Will of God' in our lives, even as we try to exercise our own individual preferences or wilfulness, without writing a theological treatise or a further sermon on that matter!

So in the Samuel reading, we note the dutifulness of Uriah, who is being set up by David to fall in battle so that he, King David, could take the lady Bathsheba, who he fancied from afar, as his. We note how Uriah wouldn't accept David's offer to leave the coming battlefield and visit and sleep with his wife before the fighting. Why not? Because of his dutifulness to his military comrades, and to military traditions. This was such a devious offer made by King David, as he didn't want to get caught out as the responsible one if possibly making Bathsheba pregnant when he took her to his bed. All a bit like something out of a poor TV soap opera story line. Uriah was killed through David's plotting, despite his dutifulness, and King David did take Bathsheba as one of his wives subsequently. God was not pleased with him, and they lost their first son, undoubtedly as God's will, but then, most importantly having repented, David went on to have other children, one of whom became King Solomon, perhaps the greatest of the Old Testament Jewish Kings and Rulers in both God's eyes and the Israelite writers of the Old Testament. But I will come back to this later. So now let's look out for dutifulness in our reading we heard from Luke. It doesn't really need me to spell this out. In Luke's story, the young girl Mary from Nazareth, a virgin and betrothed to Joseph, is faced with the enormity of a visit from the angel Gabriel (no less!) and an explanation of what was going to be her role, to give a virgin birth to a baby who would be the saviour of the world, Jesus, the son of God, who would rule for evermore (vvs31-33). The whole of Gods plan, His will for our world! It is impossible for us to comprehend the enormity of how this might have felt for Mary, yet see how she accepted this, in such a dutiful and graceful manner (v38) 'I am the Lords servant' she says. 'May it be to me as you have said'

Now there is yet more to this story than simply the dutifulness of Mary herself and its immediate consequences.

Let's look at her betrothed, Joseph, and his dutifulness. Did he reject Mary, once she told him of her pregnancy? Clearly not, he was understanding and dutiful, to her, and to God, and stayed with her. Could she have travelled to Bethlehem in her late stages of pregnancy without the support of Joseph? Clearly not, as a dutiful, caring and loving husband. In fact, would she have travelled to Bethlehem, as foretold for the birth of the Messiah, for any good reason on her own account? No, because it was the family home-town not of her, from Nazareth, but of Joseph who needed to be at his home town for the necessary Roman required civil registration of citizens.

So this leads me to the second and direct connection between our two reading today. Later in the gospel of Luke, he writes a genealogy of Joseph, (3:23, 37), which directly connects through Josephs father, Jacob, back to King Solomon and thence to Adam. This is also reflected albeit in a slightly different way, in the Gospel of St Matthew (1:1-16). And that connection could not have been made without David taking Bathsheba as his wife, and thence her becoming the mother of King Solomon.

So here is an example of God's will which is so often enabled, or disabled, through our human actions. God was certainly not pleased with David's actions over Bathsheba (2 Sam 11:27) and he was punished and forgiven subsequently – but nevertheless the result of his very dubious personal actions did result in the family line for Jesus through to Adam. So there we have our connections between these apparently very different readings concerning the birth of Jesus – dutifulness, in the biblical accounts about Mary and King David under God's Will; and the direct descent from God as foretold in our Old Testament Bibles through Joseph.

Finally I want to turn to our forthcoming celebrations on Friday. The important reading today as we look ahead to Christmas is that story of Mary, who gave birth not just to a child, but to Jesus, in form both human and divine, the son of God and our Saviour for salvation from our sins, our regressions from God. This is the biggest possible event that we humans can celebrate, dutifully indeed but really with unbounded joy. As we come to the end of this long Covid-19 year – many of us will be unable to be together with our families as is customary on Christmas Day. Perhaps we will be on our own; perhaps we will be fortunate to be with a spouse or partner or just for some maybe with very limited numbers of family and friends, under the latest government guidance.

When celebrating Christmas Day, and we will all celebrate, our focus will always be to share love, and it is within the love of God to us that we will be sharing our love. This is both our duty and joy. So whether celebrating

with others, in person or using technology like Zoom, or on your own, being dutiful in helping with hospitality preparations, perhaps helping elsewhere with making meals for the homeless or giving lifts to church for friends, or working and servicing our NHS hospitals, do indeed celebrate on this very special day the uniqueness of this occasion in our annual calendars, if only by raising a glass, and breaking some bread – not clashing but complimenting in flavours! Here's to next Friday, when we celebrate with joy the birth of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour!
