In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. ₂(This was the first census that took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria.) ₃And everyone went to his own town to register.

4So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house

and line of David. ⁵He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. ⁶While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, ⁷and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn.

8And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. 9An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified.

Sermon Rachel Johnson

Once upon a time there was a young woman called Maria, and one day Maria found out something amazing – she was going to have a baby! She rushed to tell her husband Joe, her family and her neighbours. Everyone was delighted! Joe immediately began making plans for a nursery for the new baby. Her mum and dad started phoning all their friends to pass on the exciting news that they were going to become grandparents and the neighbours brought round casseroles to keep Maria well-rested and well fed. Maria hardly got any morning sickness and thoroughly enjoyed her antenatal classes with the NCT (other providers are available). Her regular check ups showed that all was going well and that she was expecting a little boy. As Maria got bigger and wearier her neighbours stepped in to do the cleaning and Joe helped her relax by massaging her shoulders and helping her practise her breathing. When the great day finally came Maria and Joe drove to their nearest birthing centre where they were ushered into a sparkling room with a comfy bed, birthing pool, en-suite bathroom and their own dedicated midwife to help Maria through labour. Everything went as smoothly as could be and just a few short hours later Maria and Joe were the proud parents of a bouncing baby boy. Maria felt fell of energy and went home that night to enjoy family life with Joe and baby Joshua. Her friends and family brought helpful gifts like baby gros and muslins and chocolate and more casseroles, and went away again without insisting on seeing the new mum and baby, so Maria didn't have to worry about looking presentable or disturbing the baby. All in all it was the perfect way to welcome baby Joshua into the world.

Here's another story. Once upon a time there was a young woman called Mary, and one day Mary found out something amazing and terrifying she was going to have a baby. Her fiancé Joseph wasn't happy because he knew he wasn't the dad. Her mum and dad were furious - a pregnant unmarried daughter was a disgrace on the whole family. The neighbours gossiped in the marketplace. Some of them called her names. The local rabbi started looking up the regulations on stoning. Between morning sickness and heartburn and nasty looks pregnancy wasn't a pleasant time for Mary. So it was a relief when Joseph announced that he was taking her to Bethlehem for the census. Taking some of her shame on himself. But it was a difficult journey – Mary's legs were swollen and she felt faint. She didn't know if it was worse to keep putting one foot in front of the other or endure the bumpiness of a donkey ride. And Bethlehem was so crowded - visitors looking for lodgings, soldiers loitering on every street corner, cripples and beggars huddled in the gutters, visible reminders that disease, poverty and oppression stalked this town. It felt like the census had thrown the whole world into turmoil. And Mary was uncomfortably aware that she was about to face one of the most dangerous moments in a woman's life – childbirth. The only space Joseph could find for Mary to rest was amongst the animals. The straw was scratchy, the light was dim, the air was – well, let's just say it wasn't fresh. Hot water and towels and cheery midwives weren't in evidence either. But babies come when they want to come. And soon the noise and smell and fear were drowned out by pain. Until baby Jesus finally arrived and the temporary peace was broken by a succession of visitors, from unwashed shepherds to foreign kings, trailing danger in their wake. And even as Mary drank in the sight of her son's beautiful face, her beautiful, vulnerable son, cherished and feared and despised, her heart was filled with terror at what Herod's soldiers might do to him. Would baby Jesus ever have somewhere safe to lie his head?

We love to plan the perfect Christmas, don't we? Perhaps yours includes a pantomime visit or a carol service, a satsuma and a tube of smarties in

your stocking, a big family meal followed by presents round the Christmas tree, a snowy walk and the Doctor Who Christmas Special. But this year we don't have that perfect Christmas or even an average Christmas. This Christmas is coloured by grief and fear and gaping holes where our plans have been ripped to shreds. Disease is oppressing us. For many of us money is tight and loved ones are absent and hope is racing away. It's not the Christmas we would have chosen. But perhaps this is the Christmas that lets us read those familiar nativity stories with fresh eyes.

The first Christmas was marked by the turmoil of the census, the fear of poverty and disease, the tragedy of the slaughter of the innocents. Yet this was the Christmas God chose to enter into the messiness of human existence by becoming human. He didn't wait for Mary to be safely married or for maternal mortality rates to go down or for the Romans to get out of Israel or for Herod to learn compassion. God chose to enter into the suffering and darkness of everyday life and infuse it with new hope. So the shepherds went away rejoicing, the wise men bowed down in awe and wonder, the angels sang 'glory to God', and Mary and Joseph treasured up everything they saw and heard.

We share in their joy and wonder because God is still present in our story today, bringing comfort and bringing hope. God, who chose to be born in Bethlehem, still chooses to be with us today. So this is a day to celebrate because even our present darkness can't overcome the light of Emmanuel, God with us.

Our 2020 Christmas story is missing a lot but it's not missing the most important thing of all - Christ.

The Bible contains a number of prayers. Examples for us to follow. One in the Old Testament and one in the new stand out for me. Both of them present a problem before God or Jesus. They don't ask for an answer, but the presumption is that the problem will be dealt with. For example King Hezekiah received a threatening letter, from the Babylonian leader, and poor Hezekiah didn't know what to do. So he went to the temple, spread the letter out, and in effect saying this is my problem God, now it's over to you. He also reminded himself of the greatness of the God who could deal with his problem.

O Lord our Lord How majestic is your name in all the earth When I look at the heavens, the work of your fingers I am amazed For great is the Lord and greatly to be praised For the Lord made the Heavens Splendour and majesty are before Him Strength and beauty are in His sanctuary.

Another example happened at a wedding. Jesus' mother Mary came to Him with a problem, she left it with Him knowing that He would do something about it. Today we face many problems, so many. Many of them associated with the Pandemic. Our situation may be summed up in one word, uncertainty. Many face an uncertain future, facing unemployment, this is particularly so for the young people. Then there are those whose businesses are on the verge of going bust or have gone bust already. And there are those who work, day by day dealing with the virus. We are told that the NHS faces a very difficult winter. Also there is the possibility of more restrictions after Christmas in order to combat the rising infection rate. There are of course many watching loved ones suffering or grieving the loss of a loved one. Whilst we give thanks for the production of vaccines in record breaking time the vaccination programme itself presents an enormous problem. Of course, there are those who face personal problems, we remember Peter and Eileen Bliss, Olive Park, Lynda Kirk, Patrick Chapman and Joy Storkey and there are many, many, others some of them known to us personally. On top of all this uncertainty we have the uncertainty of Brexit. So here and now we lay all these problems and perhaps we can think of

many more before God and just pray one word – Help.

O Lord as we face this time with so many problems, so much uncertainty, we pray that you will see us through as individuals and as a nation.

Also we ask you to keep reminding us that those that belong to God, to Jesus will be kept by Him no matter what happens.
