About this service

Christian life and work are always undertaken with others. First there is the partnership between God and the Church – the whole people of God – clergy and laity together. And in each congregation there is also a partnership between the ordained ministry and the lay members, each with their individual gifts. Partnership therefore is the theme of this service.

Appointment

The appointment of Jonathan Thomas as Priest-in-Charge in 2014 was the conclusion of a process of discernment and prayer well over eleven years ago. This included the preparation by the Parochial Church Council of a statement of the traditions and needs of the parish and its people, and meetings of the new priest with the elected parish representatives who, together with the bishop, agreed to the appointment.

At that time, St Peter's, St Mark's and All Souls were in a period of transition from having been a 'team ministry', and so the parishes were 'suspended'. During Jonathan's ministry, the three churches have grown closer together, working on their shared ministry. Today we recognise that as the suspension is lifted, the churches are united into a single benefice and Jonathan is formally welcomed and installed as the Rector.

Revd Jonathan Thomas

Jonathan became priest-in-charge in this parish in May 2014, having served as an assistant curate at St Nicolas Cranleigh before that. Ably supported by his wife Sarah, he has enjoyed ministering in this parish for more than a decade, grateful for the many priests and lay people who have supported him in ministry and thankful to the Lord for upholding him during his ministry here.

Before the service begins ...

¶ The Gathering

Before the service begins the area dean escorts the incumbent-designate to his place in the front row, welcomes everyone and announces the first hymn

The service begins with a hymn, during which the procession enters.

Hymn

O for a thousand tongues to sing

my great Redeemer's praise, the glories of my God and King, the triumphs of His grace!

Jesus! the name that charms our fears, that bids our sorrows cease; 'tis music in the sinner's ears, 'tis life, and health, and peace.

He breaks the power of cancelled sin, He sets the prisoner free; His blood can make the foulest clean; His blood availed for me. He speaks, and, listening to His voice, new life the dead receive, the mournful, broken hearts rejoice, the humble poor believe.

Hear Him, ye deaf; His praise, ye dumb, your loosened tongues employ: ye blind, behold your Saviour come; and leap, ye lame, for joy.

My gracious Master, and my God, assist me to proclaim, to spread through all the earth abroad, the honours of Thy name.

The Greeting

The congregation remains standing.

The bishop greets the people

Blessed be God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

All Blessed be his kingdom, now and for ever. Amen.

There is one body and one spirit.

All There is one hope to which we were called;

one Lord, one faith, one baptism,

All one God and Father of all.

Peace be with you

All and also with you.

The bishop welcomes the congregation and introduces the liturgy.

The Collect

The bishop introduces a short period of silence and prays the Collect.

God our Father,
Lord of all the world,
we thank you for calling us through your Son Jesus Christ
into the fellowship of your universal Church.
Hear our prayer for your people
that each in their vocation and ministry
may be an instrument of your love.
Give to your servant Jonathan the needful gifts of grace
for the good of your Church and the welfare of all people,
through Jesus Christ our Lord.

All Amen.

¶ The Liturgy of the Word

The congregation sits.

The Reading

1 Corinthians 12:12-31 read by Talia Johnson and Rev Lucy Bush

At the end of the reading

This is the word of the Lord All Thanks be to God.

The Sermon

Hymn

For I'm building a people of power

and I'm making a people of praise, that will move through this land by My Spirit, and will glorify My precious name.

Build Your Church, Lord, make us strong, Lord, join our hearts, Lord, through Your Son; make us one, Lord, in Your body, in the kingdom of Your Son.

During the singing of this hymn, the area dean brings the incumbent designate to stand before the bishop.

The Presentation

The congregation sits.

Area Dean

Bishop Paul, I present to you Jonathan Thomas to be admitted to care for God's people as their parish priest, and request that you will collate him to this charge.

Churchwardens

On behalf of the parochial church council of this benefice, we welcome this appointment.

Bishop

I gladly accept your presentation of Jonathan and pray that God's blessing may rest upon this parish. Before I give Jonathan responsibility for the pastoral care of this benefice, I ask him before God and this congregation, to renew the promises made to Christ at ordination as a priest of his Church.

Jonathan, at our ordination we accepted the responsibility of priesthood out of love for Christ and his Church. Are you resolved to follow Jesus Christ, the Head and Shepherd of the Church, by caring as a true pastor for the people you are now called to serve? Will you seek to do all that lies within your power to build up the Church, which is the Body of Christ?

Priest

I will, with God's grace.

The congregation stands.

Bishop

Let us pray for God's grace as Jonathan seeks to be a faithful minister of Christ in this place, and that we may all be willing servants of the Kingdom.

The congregation remains standing for a period of silent prayer.

Bishop

Let us bring our prayers together, saying

All Lord, you have given us minds to know you, hearts to love you, and voices to praise your name. Give us grace to offer ourselves freely in your service that we may faithfully fulfil the worship of your Church, glorify you in our lives and share with you in bringing your Kingdom here on earth.

Amen.

The congregation sits.

The bishop introduces the required declarations and oaths in these or other words.

I now ask Jonathan to make the customary promises required by law.

Declaration of Assent

The bishop invites the new priest to make the Declaration of Assent, made at the time of ordination, and renewed each time a member of the clergy takes up a new appointment in the Church of England.

The Church of England
is part of the One, Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church
worshipping the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures
and set forth in the catholic creeds,
which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation.

Led by the Holy Spirit,

it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion,

The Book of Common Prayer
and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons.

Jonathan, in the declaration you are about to make, will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making him known to those in your care?

Priest

I, Jonathan Mark Gutteridge Thomas, do so affirm, and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments I will use only the forms of worship which are authorized or allowed by Canon.

The Oath of Allegiance

The priest, holding the Bible, faces the people and makes the customary oath to the Sovereign, reflecting the obligation of all Church of England ministers to serve the wider community.

Priest

I, Jonathan Mark Gutteridge Thomas, do swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to His Majesty King Charles III, his heirs and successors according to law: So help me God.

The Oath of Canonical Obedience

The priest, holding the Bible, faces the bishop and declares his intention to serve under the due authority of the church, personified in the office of bishop.

Priest

I, Jonathan Mark Gutteridge Thomas, do swear by Almighty God that I will pay true and canonical obedience to the Lord Bishop of Guildford and his successors, in all things lawful and honest: So help me God.

The priest and bishop then sign the declaration and oaths.

The Collation

The priest kneels.

The bishop reads the words of the deed aloud and then hands it to the priest.

Jonathan, receive the cure of souls which is both yours and mine, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

All Amen.

The bishop invokes God's blessing on the priest using fragrant oil known as Chrism from the Maundy Thursday renewal of ministries service at the Cathedral.

Jonathan, God anoint you with the spirit of holiness and joy.

The Lord bless you and watch over you;

the Lord make his face to shine upon you

and be gracious to you;

the Lord look kindly upon you and give you peace.

All Amen.

The Induction

The bishop gives the mandate to the archdeacon and asks him to proceed with the induction.

The new rector, area dean, churchwardens and archdeacon stand in front of the congregation.

The congregation stands.

The archdeacon hands the priest the mandate and says:

Jonathan, with the authority of this Mandate,
I induct you into the real actual and corporal possession
of the parish churches of this benefice
with all the rights, dignities and responsibilities belonging to your office.

The churchwardens shake hands with the priest.

A bell is tolled to signify the acceptance of office to the local community.

The Installation

The archdeacon then places the priest in the accustomed seat, saying

Jonathan, I place you in the stall of the priest of this benefice. May the Lord guard and keep you, and bless your ministry here.

Anthem

Cantate Deo from Handel's Water Music sung by Inspiration Choir

The congregation kneels.

The Prayers

The first act of the newly installed priest is to lead everyone in prayer concluding with the Lord's Prayer.

Lord of life and love

All Hear our prayer

All Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.

¶ Dedication of Priest and People in Ministry

We come as those recently baptised and confirmed.

Baptism candidate – Adam Bourne

Continue to tell the story of God's love. Baptize new disciples in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

Confirmation candidate – Brenda Collard

Peter said to the people: 'Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ so that your sins may be forgiven; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is for you, for your children, and for all who are far away, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to him.'
(Acts 2:38b-39 NRSV)

Bishop

Jonathan, will you live the new life in Christ and joyfully minister the sacrament of Baptism for those who turn to Christ?

Priest

I will, with God's grace.

All We commit our lives afresh to Christ as we continue our Christian pilgrimage.

Call to Mission

A number of ministers who have trained to be clergy or preachers stand before the priest.

Minister – Dean Pusey

We come as those called into or trained in ministry during your time ministering to us

Preacher - Paul Stanistreet

Unfold the Scriptures.
Preach the word in season and out of season, and declare the mighty acts of God.

Area Dean

Jesus unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written: The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring Good News to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour. (Luke 4:17b-19, NRSV)

Bishop

Jonathan, will you proclaim the Gospel of Christ by word and deed in your ministry?

Priest

I will, with God's grace.

All We accept our calling to share in the mission of Christ and the work of evangelism.

Call to Worship

A number of people who have trained as worship leaders stand before the priest.

Worship leader – Caroline Harvey

We come as those called to lead worship during your time leading worship for us.

Worship leader – Mark Lempriere

Preside at the Lord's table. Lead us in worship, offering with us a spiritual sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving.

Archdeacon

When Jesus had given thanks over the bread, he broke it and said, 'This is my body that is broken for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' For as often as you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes. (1 Cor. 11:24-26, NRSV)

Bishop

Jonathan, will you lead and encourage the people of this place in worship and prayer, presiding at the sacrament of the Eucharist and sharing in Holy Communion?

Priest

I will, with God's grace.

All May Christ unite us in worship, and fill our hearts with the joy of the Holy Spirit.

Call to Service

A number of those who have served as churchwardens and pastoral assistants stand before the priest.

Churchwarden – Geoff Pugh

We come as those who have served these churches as churchwardens and pastoral assistants during your time as our Priest-in-Charge.

Pastoral Assistant – Brenda Cox

Continue to pastor this community and lead this church.

Exercise wisdom and prudence in managing the resources handed on to us and which we too shall pass on.

Churchwarden – Jacquie Still

St Paul said to the elders at the church at Ephesus 'Keep watch over yourselves and over all the flock, of which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to shepherd the church of God' (Acts 20:28a NRSV)

Bishop

Jonathan, will you watch over the people entrusted to your care, and pastor them as a good shepherd looks after his flock?

Priest

I will, with God's grace.

All We turn to Christ, the great shepherd of God's flock, and seek the guidance of those chosen to guide us.

Welcoming the New Priest

The congregation sits. The area dean invites the priest's family to join him at the Chancel step.

The area dean invites everyone to welcome Jonathan in his new role

Let us all join together in welcoming Jonathan to serve this benefice as parish priest.

All In the name of the Lord, we welcome you.

The people signify their welcome with a round of applause.

The new priest responds to the welcome, gives out any notices (including details of the following Sunday's services) and the Bishop announces the final hymn:

During the hymn a collection is taken for the Bishop of Guildford's Community Fund.

¶ The Blessing and Dismissal

The congregation remains standing.

Bishop

Our help is in the name of the Lord,

All who has made heaven and earth.

Blessed be the name of the Lord,

All now and for ever. Amen.

May God the Father, who created you, fulfil in you his heavenly purpose.

All Amen.

Bishop

May God the Son, who redeemed you, be always present with you, to guide and support you in the work which you do for him and his Church.

All Amen.

Bishop

May God the Holy Spirit, who sanctifies and strengthens you, fill your hearts and minds with all that you need to serve God faithfully.

All Amen.

Bishop

The Blessing of God Almighty, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, be among you and remain with you always.

All Amen.

New priest

Go in peace to love and serve the Lord.

All In the name of Christ. Amen.

In the closing procession the newly installed priest walks alongside the bishop.

Everyone is warmly invited to join us in for refreshments after the service where there will be an opportunity to celebrate the mission and ministry of the church.

Notes

The 'institution' of a rector or vicar (called 'collation' when the bishop is the patron) or the licensing of a priest-in-charge or team vicar is performed by the bishop, who thereby commits to the priest to the spiritual care of the parish, part of the 'cure of souls' entrusted by God to the bishop.

The 'induction' of a rector or vicar who has been 'instituted' by the bishop is normally performed by the archdeacon, and gives the Incumbent possession of the temporalities as opposed to the spiritualities of the parish.

Those given pastoral charge of a parish must first have been ordained deacon and priest (that is, a 'presbyter'), and this service recalls the solemn vows and promises made at the ordination service. In this order of service, the term 'priest' is used even if the office is known as a rector, vicar or priest-in-charge.



The Bishop of Guildford's Communities Fund (BGCF) exists to reach out to disadvantaged and vulnerable people across the Diocese of Guildford in the name of Christ.
